4. learning objectives

6. teaching methods

- Frontal teaching oriented towards interactive teaching and aimed at understanding written and oral texts.
- Grammar exercises and text analysis with true/false questions, gap fills, use of English, open questions and multiple

choice

- interactive frontal lessons through the use of slide shows, images and videos;
- discussion and analysis of emblematic clinical-assistance cases through discussions with experts in the sector, group

work (which favors the development of critical thinking, decision-making, self-learning skills and group cooperation).

For these activities, remote consultancy from the teacher is provided (if requested by the student);

8. methods for verifying learning and for evaluation

For English:

The assessment of learning takes place on the basis of a written test, which involves the following exercises:

grammar (multiple choice, completion); words (cloze, matching); reading comprehension (multiple choice questions).

The evaluation with judgment of suitability takes place during a subsequent oral session.

During the course there will be an ongoing test (scheduled in the teaching hours of the 2nd semester).

For Palliative Care Seminar: the assessment of learning takes place on the basis of individual and group work and the final individual learning report

The exam will be conducted in presence and through the use of an institutional platform.
